

Message from the President by Sr. Jeanne Weber

It has been way too long since the last edition of "The Gleaner," which was published in January of this year. Upon getting vaccinated for Covid in January and February, I was able to resume traveling, and have been on the road quite steadily ever since. In February and March we held elections at Cottonwood, Beech Grove, and Martin. We also had the Federation Council meeting at Beech Grove. It was wonderful to be able to visit the federation monasteries again. As president, I've always experienced a warm welcome from the communities of the federation, however never more so than after a year of isolation due to the pandemic. One of my airport chauffeurs (Ann Papesh from Beech Grove) fairly gushed her gratitude at being able to drive to the airport to meet me (at 10:00 at night, no less). I laughed and observed that they probably hadn't let her out for awhile! It was also wonderful to meet in person with the Council—all except Mary Coswin as the U.S./ Canada border was still closed.

In April, I spent time in Watertown visiting with the sisters and learning about the senior living project that they are planning. We had planned that visit for early December, but Covid in both Yankton and Watertown meant deferring it. Visitation at Madison was also delayed from December until April. The silver lining on that cloud was being able to enjoy the natural beauty of the monastery at Madison in the warmth of April as compared to the cold of December.

In May, the men and women Benedictine presidents met at Elizabeth, New Jersey. We were privileged to spend the morning with Cardinal Archbishop Joe Tobin, who reflected with us on the relationship between religious and the local church. In the afternoon we heard from Auxiliary Bishop Elias Lorenzo, OSB, also of the Newark NJ archdiocese, who spoke about working with the various Vatican dicasteries. Elias is the former president of the American Cassinese Congregation.

Also in May we held the Conference of Prioresses meeting virtually, after which I traveled to Ferdinand for visitation. In June, it was back to Beech Grove and Martin for installation of their newly elected prioresses. In July, I was able to get out to Mount Angel and also to make a quick trip to Rapid City to meet with the sisters there.

In August, the three federations and the BSPA (Clyde) congregation sponsored a workshop for visitators, which was a great success. We had 52 participants from 18 monasteries in attendance for this three-day Zoom workshop. Speakers were Bishop Elias Lorenzo, OSB, and Sisters Aileen Bankemper, Susan Hutchens, Lynn McKenzie, Kerry O'Reilly, Dawn Mills, and myself. The original plan had been to hold the workshop at Sacred Heart Monastery in Cullman. The resurgence of Covid necessitated us going online with the workshop. The upside was that we were able to accommodate more participants in the online format.

The resurgence of Covid also meant that we were unable to gather in person for our long deferred Federation Chapter meeting. After having postponed the chapter three times, the Federation Council and I, with input from our canonist, Fr. Dan Ward, made the decision to cancel the in-person chapter and proceed with an online meeting. Because of Congregation for Religious (CICLSAL) regulations regarding online



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general chapter meetings, we were unable to carry out the canonical business of the chapter (election of councilors and several amendments to *Listen II*). Over our two sessions, in June and August, we were able to accomplish several other pieces of business, including: accepting 2017-21 financial statements, approving the three-year budget, reviewing the handbook on the modification and suspension of regular monastic governance (which was commissioned by the 2017 Chapter), reviewing and refining the 2017 direction statements, and hearing the President's address and the keynote speeches.

I would like to comment particularly on the keynote speeches for the Chapter. Our speakers for the day were Emily Cash, Psy.D. from St. Luke's Institute in Louisville Kentucky, and Sr. Marielle Frigge, OSB from Sacred Heart Monastery in Yankton, SD. We had asked Emily and Sr. Marielle to address our collective journey through transition, and the grieving that comes with it, from the emotional/psychological and theological/scriptural perspectives. Emily's talk focused on the stages we go through whenever we are faced with a significant transition. She also gave us concrete strategies to help us navigate these transitions. Sr. Marielle's talk, titled "Lament and Praise in a Time of Transition," opened up the biblical laments as well-springs of prayer and dialogue with God in times of difficulty. Both talks were rich, bringing meaning to the situations in which we find our monastic communities, our church, and our world. I found the congruence of their messages quite amazing. Once the recordings are available, I will send them out so they may be shared with your monastic communities.

In terms of the canonical business that we weren't able to accomplish, current councilors have had their terms extended until the 2023 Federation Chapter. The business of considering amendments to our Listen II document will also wait until that Chapter, which will be held June 10-17, 2023 in Beech Grove.

All this by way of telling you why there hasn't been an edition of *The Gleaner* since January. I hope that you will enjoy catching up on the news of the Federation—and that my "excuses" carry more weight than "the dog ate my homework."

CROOKSTON NEWS

The Diocese of Crookston has agreed to purchase the monastery property, allowing the sisters to remain in a portion of the building. The diocese will move their offices here and also open a center here for their meetings and retreats. But it may be two to three years before they raise the funds and move in. Meanwhile we have appointed ourselves a Moving Committee and have begun cleaning out closets.

The diocese named their capital campaign The Perfect Fit, which we hope it will be. The campaign has disrupted our



perfect lives at times, with tours and receptions for prospective donors. The diocese also made a five-minute video (available at http://www.crookston.org/perfectfit) to promote their cause, and we sisters had the fun of being filmed for it.




YANKTON SISTERS BEATING THE COVID BLUES

"We need to celebrate, because celebration brings us hope," summarized, friend Jerry Folk.



MOUNT ANGEL CELEBRATES OKTOBERFEST

Mount Angel, Oregon is a small town that hosts one of the largest Oktoberfest celebrations in the country. This year, Oktoberfest was held in-person after being held virtually in 2020. Each year, the Benedictine Sisters of Queen of Angels Monastery set up a booth in the arts and crafts section to sell various handmade crafts and goods. One of the most popular items sold are buttermilk coffee cakes made famous by the late Sister Immaculata.

Although the Oktoberfest was held in person, the sisters elected to host their own booth in the lobby of the monastery's Hospitality Center. Sister Rebecca Pirkl led the effort to transform the lobby into an Oktoberfest booth unlike any other. Over the course of the four-day festival, nearly 300 coffee cakes were sold and countless other items including prayer shawls, rosaries, books, coins, and photo cards – all made by the sisters!

The "booth" was a huge success and it turned out to be one of the most successful Oktoberfests ever!



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FERDINAND NEWS

<u>Automated Bells</u>: Shortly after Christmas, the three bells at the monastery were removed from the bell tower and transported to Cincinnati to be refurbished and fitted to be rung automatically. The bells returned to the bell tower toward the end of Lent,

complete with new steel stands, yokes, strikers, wheels, and clappers. Then, a digital controller was installed, allowing the bells to be programmed to ring at the appropriate times. The refurbished bells rang for the first time on Easter Sunday morning. It was an exciting moment to watch the bells return to the bell tower and



then to hear them ring automatically for the first time. Having enough sisters who were able to ring the bells by hand had become problematic for the community. With automation, the bells continue

to call the community to prayer, and their sound is heard throughout the town of Ferdinand as a reminder to all of the call to give glory to God each day.

Jamaica Mission: Establishing a mission house in Jamaica wasn't in our long range plan, but issues with immigration forced our hand. Sr. Roxanne Cassandra Higgins is a temporary professed member of our community and came here from Jamaica with a religious worker visa. The immigration policies from the past years as well as the effects of the pandemic on immigration offices being open has caused a major backlog in cases. While we filed the request for Sr. Roxanne's petition to change status in order to apply for permanent residency with more than adequate time, that request has not yet been processed, and we don't know how much longer it will take. By the end of September, though, she had to leave the country. In order to provide community for her, we are sending two sisters to accompany her. The

Franciscan Sisters of Allegany have offered us housing in Kingston and will be helping the three sisters offer volunteer services while there. We expect to rotate the sisters staying with Sr. Roxanne. The Archdiocese of Kingston offered a welcome to our community, saying in part: "We look forward to their sharing in the life of our Archdiocese and bringing to the fore the spirituality of Saint Benedict and Saint Scholastica during their stay amongst us." 
