Message from the President by Sr. Jeanne Weber

This year, the slice of post-Christmas Ordinary Time is short, and by the time this newsletter comes out, we will be on the doorstep of Lent. Lent, this year, might be a fitting time to reflect, personally or communally, on the first direction statement that the Monastic Congregation Chapter set last summer.

As witnesses to Benedictine life, we commit ourselves to be communities of peace, safety, and prayer for all and to engage in deeper conversations with the church and the world.

One lens through which we might view this statement is its focus on interconnectedness and relationship, not only within and among our monastic communities, but with the broader communities of our church and world, and indeed, the whole of the cosmos. Modern research in both particle and astrophysics is showing us that all of creation, including the human, is connected in ways that, while not always available to our sensory perception, are nonetheless real. In his recent address to the Leadership Conference of Women Religious, Brian Swimme, an evolutionary cosmologist, says that the development of the entire universe "takes place through the power of relationship" and that indeed, "relationship is the most fundamental power in the universe" (Address to LCWR Assembly, August, 2023). He takes this all of the way back to the primordial flaring forth (his words) that scientists have come to call "the Big Bang." In that 14



billion year ago cataclysm, protons coming into relationship with electrons created the first hydrogen atoms. These, and other primal atoms, became the building blocks of the galaxies, launching the cosmos as we know it. Likewise, around 700 million years ago, unicellular organisms, which were the only form of life on earth for three billion years, began to enter into the relationships which enabled more complex plant and animal life to evolve. When I read what science is discovering about the creation and evolution of the universe I experience awe and wonder. With each scientific discovery, the mystery of the power of love that we call God only deepens. Swimme seems to share that stance of wonder in this passage in which he is speaking about supernovas:

After a certain span of time [in the evolution of the cosmos] in which all the elements are created in the core of a large star, it explodes. Because of that explosion we exist. Every element of our body was fashioned inside a star. The explosion of a star is a primary revelation of love at a cosmological level. A love that is a divine give away. A love that holds nothing back...A love that reveals the heart of divinity. The star dies in its final act of generosity, and out of that generosity, the future of the universe is born (ibid).

Swimme's words bring to mind the beautiful hymn that opens the letter to the Philippians: *Have among yourselves the same attitude that is also yours in Christ Jesus, Who, though he was in the form of God, / did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. / Rather, he emptied himself, / taking the form of a slave...* (Philippians 2:1-11, NRSV).

The nature of God and the nature of the universe created by God, is Love, Love that is willing to give itself totally—to the point of death—for the other. Our world, fractured and wounded as it is, desperately needs the monastic witness of self-giving love, our becoming ever-more-deeply communities of peace, safety, and prayer for all. Let us support one another with our prayers and through the witness of Benedictine Love and Peace.

A transfer ceremony is planned for March 20, 2024, during which CCS, the Benedictine Sisters and guests will come together to pray, celebrate and share hopes and dreams for the future of the monastery's buildings and land.

The Sisters have owned the historic monastery and grounds of Queen of Angels Monastery since 1887 when they purchased the property from Mount Angel Abbey. They have shared their monastic buildings and grounds in ministry to countless guests, students, oblates, retreatants, family, and friends. Now they entrust the mission and use of the property to Catholic Community Services and look forward to seeing what develops. They are deeply grateful for the partnership with and commitment of CCS to the people of Mount Angel, Marion County and beyond as well as to the many people who continue to support the Benedictine Sisters.


ST SCHOLASTICA MONASTERY, FORT SMITH




MONASTERY IMMACULATE CONCEPTION, FERDINAND

Working closely with this team is a sister liaison, appointed by the Prioress. The new director is Oblate Stephanie Smith. The formation coordinator is Oblate Shirley France, and the communication coordinator is Oblate Lynn Belli. Sr. Betty Drewes is currently serving as the sister liaison. The new leadership was blessed and installed for a term of three years by Sr. Anita Louise at the monthly gathering of the Oblates on Sunday, January 14.

Renovation Work Underway

Last year, we made the decision to close our in-house licensed nursing facility, Hildegard Health Center, and to transition sisters needing nursing care to Scenic Hills at the Monastery, a privately owned nursing facility located on our property. This move has allowed us to do some renovation work of the third floor of St. Benedict Hall where Hildegard Health Center had been located. Work includes installing water efficient toilets, changing out bathroom fixtures, installing LED lighting, painting, and adding shower stalls in the common shower rooms. Plus, one room, formerly used as an office, will be transformed into a new, hair care room for all the sisters' use.

When finished, Community Health, our quasi-assisted living area, will move to this floor. There will be 16 bedrooms for sisters who live on the floor along with 2 rooms set aside for sisters recovering from surgeries, injuries, etc. Work on this floor is scheduled to be completed by late spring/early summer. The renovation coincides with recommendations from our planning process with KEB consultants, which was completed last summer.



DWELLING PLACE MONASTERY, MARTIN

The Kentucky sisters of the Dwelling Place Monastery are growing, in new ways. We are currently in the process of adding a new form of membership to our community, that of claustral oblate. In fact, we have our first candidate, Chris Becker.

Chris is one of our oblates and lived with us for over two years while she worked in the region before moving back to Ohio to be with family. After having several in-house meetings about what we were calling "other forms of membership" we found a document by Fr. Dan Ward about claustral oblates. This form of belonging seemed to be a good fit for us and the more we talked about it, the more we felt called to try it here. And immediately we thought of Chris, who had been doing her own discernment on what was next for her journey.

Chris joined us in November and is actively participating in the daily life here at Mt Tabor as well as being part of the development team on this new way to live in our monastic community. She is a very good fit for us and, while there are bumps in the road that come with anyone new to a community, we are all pleased with the possibilities God has given us to continue living our monastic life here at the Dwelling Place. 



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In Memorium: Ruth Fox, OSB, 1936-2023



Sister Ruth Fox, 8th President of the Monastic Congregation of St. Gertrude and member of Sacred Heart Monastery in Dickinson, ND died on September 23, 2023 at Good Samaritan St. Vincent's in Bismarck, where she had been residing since August of 2022. According to Sister Paula Larson, Sister Ruth was a farm girl from North Dakota who made her first contact with the Benedictine Sisters as a youngster when the Sisters came to teach summer catechism. This contact was the beginning seed of a long and fruitful Benedictine life.

Sister Kathryn Huber and Sister Joella Kidwell, two of Ruth's successors as president, characterize her as a model of monastic living, a woman of prayer and service, a teacher and model of feminine leadership, and a wise steward. She brought to the role of president a deep knowledge of church and monastic history, as well as of women in the scriptures.

Sister Kathryn remembers that in 1992 when she was a relatively new prioress, Sister Ruth conducted the canonical visitation of the Ferdinand community. She says, "Sister Ruth provided a listening and gentle presence. I recall her being an encourager and comforter not only to the community but to me personally." She also relates that at the time of that visitation, an earthquake was predicted along a fault near southern Indiana and preparations were being made. "I recall Sister Ruth carrying her plane ticket with her the entire time. I did not have the heart to tell her there were about 12 bridges and overpasses on the Interstate between Ferdinand and the Louisville airport. Fortunately, there was no earthquake and all ended well!"

Sister Joella remembers Sister Ruth as supportive and also challenging when necessary. "I recall her meeting with me and sharing there was another way to do a task that I was about and to do it a little more gently. I also admired how Sister Ruth served us as President and at the same time lived monastic life fully in her own community. And I recall her encouragement during the challenging years of my time as Federation President."

Sister Kathryn served with Sister Ruth on the Federation Council from 1993-1999, including as First Councilor. Of that time she says, "It was a great experience to share, travel, and work with Ruth. She organized and facilitated each meeting with grace and professionalism. Time for fun was always included." Sister Kathryn also recalls that Sister Ruth highly respected the autonomy of member monasteries. "When Spirit of Life Monastery in Lakewood, CO was down to two members, the council encouraged Sister Ruth to approach them about closure. Sister Ruth felt it was better to let the community come to this decision themselves. Just two weeks later the two sisters contacted Sister Ruth for assistance with closure."

Sr. Kathryn reflects that, as prioress of her own community and as Federation President, Sister Ruth walked in a line of strong monastic leaders. In the early 2000s the Council commissioned her to write a book on the topic of monastic leadership. She graciously accepted the commission and Wisdom Leadership: Reflections on the Ministry of Monastic Leadership was published in 2003. "It is a treasure for monastic leadership to this day." Both Sisters Kathryn and Joella regard themselves blessed to have known Sister Ruth Fox as colleague, mentor, companion, and friend.

Sister Paula shares that Sister Ruth's sisters at Sacred Heart Monastery "experienced her as a wholesome person fully involved in monastic spirituality and living. We supported her in sharing her wisdom as a monastic woman not only at home but throughout the United States and abroad. She had a unique and gentle way of saying what needed to be said or written. She was always willing to share her learning with us. We feel blessed to have had her in our community and I know she would say likewise."

May this wise and gentle woman, monastic, and leader rest in peace.
